An elegant capital with a European-flavored sophistication, and a passionate culture, this contemporary city is bursting with energy, its streets lined with bustling parillas (grill restaurants) and colorful curios, while the chimes of skilled musicians flow from street corners and nightspots alike.

The detailed itinerary...

Day 1 - Jan 30, 2019 (Wed) - Depart Toronto for Buenos Aries (Argentina)

Depart Toronto on international overnight flight to Buenos Aries on Air Canada arriving in Buenos Aries the next day.

Day 2 - Jan 31 - Arrive Buenos Aries (Argentina) (L, D)



Buenos Aries, the capital of Argentina, is the most cosmopolitan city in South America, with over 14 million inhabitants and a nickname of the "Paris of the Americas". It is a charming city with a strong influence of the most important European cities. Beautiful walks, avenues and parks, monumental buildings, pavement cafes, museums and churches gathered in 26 districts, each with a personality of its own, give her an undeniable cosmopolitan air.

The aristocratic Northern quarter resembles the most elegant areas in Paris; Avenida de Mayo and its innumerable coffee houses revive the flavor of Madrid's Gran Via; the shady Belgrano streets recall the charm of the distinguished London's suburbs; Naples seems to be present in the noisy and colored La Boca quarter.

The city began as a centre for contraband, as the Portuguese, English and French took advantage of the lack of a strong Spanish presence in the area around the Rio de la Plata in the 17th Century. However, when the Spanish realised the competition it was facing for control of the region, they declared the area of what is now Argentina, Paraguay, Uruguay and Bolivia a viceroyalty, and made Buenos Aires the capital. With this new financial, judicial and military role, the city began its transformation into a major cosmopolitan city. The peak of this was in the late 19th and early 20th Centuries, when Buenos Aires was one of the richest cities in the world as its leaders provided the enterprise and the many hundreds of thousands of European immigrants provided the labour to fuel the booming export led economy. Political and economic turmoil has seen the city lose some of its power during the 20th Century, but the legacy of its rich past remains visible in all corners of the city.





Morning arrival in Buenos Aries where you will be met by your local guide and transferred to your hotel.

Check-in and lunch at the hotel.

In the afternoon, there will be an initial orientation tour of the city.

Dinner and overnight in Buenos Aries.

Day 3 - Feb 1 - Buenos Aries - City tour (B, L)

Breakfast at the hotel.

Physicians - Early morning visit to Hospital Clinicas Jose De San Martin, a medical facility in Buenos Aries to learn about the Argentinean healthcare system and meet with local doctors.

Afterwards meet up with the rest of the group for a **city tour of Buenos Aries.** Drive down 9 de Julio Ave. the widest in the world, past the famous Colon Opera house, the Obelisk commemorating the first founding of the city in 1536 to get to Plaza de Mayo (May Square), and the buildings surrounding it: Government House, Metropolitan Cathedral with the Mausoleum of General San Martin, Argentina's greatest national hero and the Cabildo, the colonia town hall built in 1751. The tour finishes in La Boca, an area greatly influenced by the Italian immigrants who settled there, and the brightly painted houses of 'Caminito' street.



Lunch will be at a typical local restaurant, before continuing to the Buenos Aires port area, past San Martin Square towards Palermo Chico residential district and Palermo Park with its jacaranda and palo borracho trees which flower in the spring and late summer. Continue to the elegant Recoleta district to visit Recoleta Cementery where the famous are laid to rest (including Eva Peron). Finally, return to the hotel along the stylish Alvear Ave.

Evening at leisure. Overnight in Buenos Aries.



Day 4 - Feb 2 - Buenos Aries - Tigre & Delta tour (B, L)



Breakfast at the hotel.

Embark on a full day **Tigre and Delta tour** through the elegant northern riverside suburbs of Vicente Lopez, Olivos, where the President's Residence is located, San Isidro with its gothic Cathedral and San Fernando to Tigre, a charming city with many rowing, canoeing and yacht clubs, summer residences, and restaurants by the riverside. After lunch at a local restaurant (La Bistecca), enjoy a cruise aboard a typical motor boat along the Parana River Delta. The Delta is 220 square kilometres in size and small islands and numerous streams are spread throughout the area. The nearby Lujan, Sarmiento, Tigre and San Antonio rivers are all part of the voyage. The tour returns along the Panamericana Highway.

Evening at leisure. Overnight in Buenos Aries.

Day 5 - Feb 3 - Buenos Aries, including Tango Show (B, D)

Breakfast at the hotel.

Today, enjoy free time to continue to explore this fascinating city independently.

In the evening, experience one of the city's most famous activities – the **Tango**. At a unique venue, learn this sensual and captivating dance for yourself in a one hour lesson before sitting down to a traditional Argentine dinner while you enjoy a spectacular floor show sketching the history of popular Argentina music. In this musical extravaganza, the main protagonist is the Tango, where the roots of Argentine culture are strengthened, enhanced by the decoration and special ambience. Day 5 - Feb 4 - Buenos Aries - Ushuaia (Argentina) (B, D)



Tierra del Fuego (Land of Fire) lies at the very southern tip of the South American continent. Beyond it there is only the icy mass of Antarctica. The story goes that the area got its name from early European explorers, who when passing by on ships, en route to riches further west, could see the landscape dotted with the campfires of the islands' original inhabitants. The very name, Tierra del Fuego, evokes feelings of distance, fear of the elements, isolation, loneliness, although now this has changed, as it is now a popular destination for travelers, that usually enter by **Ushuaia**, the capital of the territory and southernmost city in the world. Its first inhabitants, the yamana, called it "the inside door to the west". Ushuaia is situated beside the Beagle Channel and surrounded by the Martial Range. This city shows a unique landscape in Argentina, a combination of mountains, sea, glaciers and forest. From the shore and looking southwards it's possible to have a wonderful view of the bay, the peninsula, the Beagle Channel and Navarino and Hoste Islands. This city has a good shopping center and is characterized by its typical and colorful houses. Explore some restaurants to try the excellent spider crabs and the lamb B.B.Q. or stroll around the old picturesque harbour.

Breakfast at the hotel.

Transfer to the airport for your flight to Ushuaia. You will be met on arrival by your local guide and transferred to your hotel.

In the afternoon discover the **Lapataia National Park**. Close to Ushuaia, the park was created in 1960 and became the southernmost preserved area in Argentina. The topography is extremely rough - a succession of craggy mountains, rivers valleys and numerous lakes. There are six species of trees and a large variety of flowers (yellow violets; white, green and yellow orchids; seapinks). You will also see a large variety of birds as well as silver fox, upland geese, rabbit, muskrat, beaver, salmon, trout, tailed hake and sardines. On the shores there are crabs, sea snails and mussels.





Your tour will include the "End of the World" train ride. One of only two narrow-guage tracks left in Argentina, the F.A.F. (Ferrocarril Austral Fueguino), is impressive not only for its style but for its links to the history of Ushuaia as it used to ferry prisoners from the island's prison stronghold into the national park to fell and chop trees. The train consists of steam locomotives, and coaches, comfortably heated and fitted with large windows. It leaves from Estación del Fin del Mundo (End of the World Station), 8 km West of Ushuaia, And steams slowly along the Pipo Valley and it's Ensenada Bay until it reaches the Macarena Waterfalls. The train continue into the National Park with it's stunning views of Mount Susana, the Martial Glacier, the Beagle Channel and Redonda Island. Your ride ends at the Estación del Parque (Park Station) where a visit to the F.A.F. workshops, the small museum and a display of historical photographs should not be missed.

Dinner at the hotel. Overnight in Ushuaia.



Day 6 - Feb 5 - Ushuaia - Patagonia Cruise (Ventus Australis) (B, D)



Breakfast at the hotel.

Physicians - visit to the Regional (Public) Hospital Ushuaia to learn about local public healthcare in the region.

Non-physicians - Free time to explore the town of Ushuaia before being joining your physician partners and being transferred to the pier to board the Ventis Australis for the next component of your tour.

Cruise ship boarding late afternoon where the captain and crew give a welcome cocktail reception on board. Immediately afterward, the ship will set sail for one of the remotest parts of the planet.

CRUISE OVERVIEW

Explore Patagonia on an adventurous **five-day, four-night** journeys between Ushuaia (Argentina) to Punta Arenas (Chile) through some of planet's most remote places and incredible scenery. Discover the wild beauty of Patagonia on an the **Ventus Australis** cruise that showcases the region's pristine landscapes, rich wildlife and fascinating human history aboard an expedition ship that brings an extraordinary level of comfort and service to the uttermost edge of the world. Leaving the twinkling lights of Ushuaia behind, the vessel calls on fabled spots like Cape Horn and Wulaia Bay before cruising down the Beagle Channel. Continuing through the maze of islands, we'll visit a number of glaciers, frozen giants that guard the southern flank of the Fuegian Archipelago, before entering the legendary Strait of Magellan. Last stop is the Isla Magdalena and its boisterous Patagonia penguin colony before docking at Punta Arenas.

During the cruise, there will be the following CME activities which will take place when the ship is sailing between the island visits -

- Lectures by Canadian physicians
- "Patagonia: From ice to flowers" a presentation that details the evolution of local flora after the last Ice Age, which covered more than 60% of Patagonia, including a discussion of the more important trees, shrubs, flowers and plants that inhabit Patagonia and Tierra del Fuego today and how they have been used as part of Aborginal natural medicine
- Visit to the ship's hospital to meet with ship's doctor learn about common onboard medical issues

Day 7 - Feb 6 - Patagonia Cruise (Ventus Australis) - Cape Horn / Wulaia Bay (B, L, D)





Around the break of dawn, the Australis cruise crosses Nassau Bay and enters the remote archipelago that comprises Cape Horn National Park. Weather and sea conditions permitting, go ashore on the windswept island that harbors legendary **Cape Horn** (Cabo de Hornos). Discovered in 1616 by a Dutch maritime expedition -- and named after the town of Hoorn in West Friesland -- Cape Horn is a sheer 425-meter (1,394-foot) high rocky promontory overlooking the turbulent waters of the Drake Passage. For many years it was the only navigation route between the Pacific and Atlantic, and was often referred to as the "End of the Earth." The park was declared a World Biosphere Reserve by UNESCO in 2005. The Chilean navy maintains a permanent lighthouse on the island, staffed by a lightkeeper and his family, as well as the tiny Stella Maris Chapel and modern Cape Horn Monument (currently awaiting repair after being damaged by fierce winds).

Sailing back across Nassau Bay, anchor at fabled **Wulaia Bay**, one of the few places in the archipelago where the human history is just as compelling as the natural environment. Originally the site of one of the region's largest Yámana aboriginal settlements, the bay was described by Charles Darwin and sketched by Captain FitzRoy in the 1830s during their voyages on HMS Beagle. This area is also renowned for its mesmerizing beauty and dramatic geography. After a visit to the Australis-sponsored museum in the old radio station -- which is especially strong on the Yámana people and European missionaries in the area -- passengers have a choice of three hikes (of increasing degrees of difficulty) that ascend the heavily wooded mountain behind the bay. On all of these you stroll through an enchanted Magellanic forest of lengas, coigües, canelos and ferns to reach panoramic viewpoints overlooking the bay.

Day 8 – Feb 7 - Patagonia Cruise (Ventus Australis) – Pía Glacier / Garibaldi Glacier (B, L, D)





Overnight, the cruise continues the Patagonia glacier tour around the western end of Tierra del Fuego via the very narrow **Gabrial Channel**, **Magdalena Channel and Cockburn Channel**. After rounding the remote Brecknock Peninsula, the ship tacks eastward and enters the Beagle Channel again. By morning we are entering Pia Fjord and boarding the Zodiacs for a shore excursion to **Pia Glacier**. After disembarking, take a short hike to gain a panoramic view of the spectacular glacier, which extends from the mountaintops down to the sea or a longer much more difficult walk up a lateral moraine of the old Pia Glacier.

No one knows for certain how the hulking mass of snow and ice got its feminine moniker, but one theory says it was named for Princess Maria Pia of Savoy (1847-1911), daughter of the Italian king.

Making our way further west along the Beagle Channel, enter another long fjord and drop anchor near **Garibaldi Glacier** for another shore excursion. Garibaldi is one of only three glaciers in Patagonia gaining mass rather than staying the same or slowly shrinking. This time we hike through virgin Magellanic forest to a glacial waterfall, a towering wall of ferns and moss, and spectacular viewpoints looking down on the glacier and fjord. The walk is demanding -- very steep, negligible trail, rough footing -- and not for everyone. For those who choose to stay onboard, our captain will point the bow towards the beautiful sky blue Garibaldi Glacier so everyone can enjoy the panoramic view from the upper decks.



Day 9 – Feb 8 - Patagonia Cruise (Ventus Australis) – Agostini Sound / Aguila Glacier / Condor Glacier (B, L,D)



Early in the morning, sail through the Cockburn Channel and enter **Agostini Sound**. From there it is possible to see the glaciers that descend from the middle of the Darwin Mountain Range -- some of them reaching the water. This morning, disembark and go for an easy walk around a lagoon, which was formed by the melting of the **Águila Glacier**. It's the perfect opportunity to experience the beauty of Patagonia's cold rainforest and to see how the power of nature has molded the spectacular landscape. Reach a spot right in front of that glacier with stunning views. In the afternoon, approach the **Condor Glacier** via zodiac -- and hopefully see some of the abundant Andean Condors in the area.

Day 10 - Feb 9 - Patagonia Cruise (Ventus Australis) - Punta Arenas - Puerto Natales (Chile) (B)



After an overnight cruise through **Magdalena Channel** and back into the Strait of Magellan, anchor off **Magdalena Island**, which lies about halfway between Tierra del Fuego and the Chilean mainland. Crowned by a distinctive lighthouse, the island used to be an essential source of supplies for navigators and explorers and is inhabited by an immense colony of Magellanic penguins. At the break of dawn, weather permitting, go ashore and hike a path that leads through thousands of penguins to a small museum lodged inside the vintage 1902 lighthouse. Many other bird species are also found on the island. In September and April -- when the penguins dwell elsewhere -- this excursion is replaced by a ride aboard Zodiacs to Marta Island to observe South American sea lions. After a short cruise south along the strait, disembarkation at Punta Arenas is scheduled for around 11:30 AM.

Upon disembarkation in Punta Arenas, you will be met by your local Chilean tour escort.



Lying 3,090 km from Santiago, **Punta Arenas** is the most southern city in Chile. It was founded in 1848 as a military fort to reinforce the Chilean claim to sovereignty over the Magellan Straits and to house the settlers of Fuerte Bulnes. The consolidation of the town took place between 1875 and 1885, after it had been destroyed in various mutinies. From this period the city became dedicated to stock-raising, attracting successive waves of immigrants. In 1945 deposits of oil were discovered, which changed the face of the city as it became the administrative and residential center for the personnel working in oil extraction. Today, it is an important center for the exportation of wool, hides, mutton and wood and there are sawmills, tanneries and facilities for freezing meat and canning fish.



There will be a short city tour before heading north proceeding through the endless Patagonian steppes, crossing trout-filled rivers and passing beech tree forests and numerous sheep ranches en route to Puerto Natales.

Check in to your hotel and evening at leisure. Overnight in Puerto Natales.


Day 11 - Feb 10 - Puerto Natales (Torres del Paine National Park) (B, L)

Located on the shore of the Seno Última Esperanza, **Puerto Natales** lies close to the Riesco mountain range and is the center of administrative and commercial services for the intense cattle ranching activity in the province. It was founded in 1911 and is the gateway for Torres del Paine National Park, the Cueva del Milodón or the glaciers of the Campo de Hielo Sur.

Comprising 242,242 hectares, **Torres del Paine National Park** was created in 1959 and declared a World Biosphere Reserve by UNESCO in 1978. It is located between the Andes and the Patagonian Steppe.

There are four quite different types of flora in the park: the Pre-Andean scrub, which is adapted to cold and drought and is found primarily on the shores of Lago Sarmiento and Salto Grande; the Deciduous Magellanic Forest, composed mainly of lenga; the Magellanic Tundra, made up basically of mosses; and the High Altitude Desert, which has small shrubs that gradually peter out as the altitude increases. The most famous feature of the park, Cuernos del Paine are known world wide for their magnificent appearance: these gigantic rocky masses can be seen from the trails that cross the Park, providing a setting for the glaciers and the lakes dotted with ice throughout the park.





Today, explore the spectacular **Torres del Paine** National Park. Visit the huge "Cueva del Milodón", a declared Natural Monument, where the German settler Hermann Eberhard found a prehistoric animal, Milodón, in 1896. Then stop in Cerro Castillo, a charming border town, before arriving at the entrance to the Park at Laguna Amarga where there is an excellent panoramic view of the mountains and of the famous towers "Las Torres". Driving through the Park, enjoy the beauty of the natural surroundings, such as Nordenskjold Lake, Pehoé Lake, Salto Grande and Grey Lake with its spectacular glacier. Fantastic views of the mountains are set in this incredible landscape, including the famous horns (Los Cuernos) of the Torres Massif. Lunch will be taken in a local hosteria and there will be time for some short hikes to reach the most beautiful spots of the Park and to witness the diverse flora and fauna, condors, the king of the air, guanacos ñandus and many other bird species.

Return to Puerto Natales, visiting the **Mylodon's Cave** on the way, an impressive natural cave where a gigantic prehistoric fossil was discovered, a replica of which can be seen at the entrance of the cave.

Arrival back at the hotel in Puerto Natales early evening.

Evening at leisure. Overnight in Puerto Natales.

Day 12 - Feb 11 - Puerto Natales - Santiago - Vina del Mar (Chile) (B)

Central Chile is the cultural nucleus of the country and home to the cosmopolitan capital of Santiago as well as the attractive beach resorts 70 mile west on the Pacific Coast. It has an agreeable Mediterranean climate and is the heart of Chile's wine producing region, with no less than 4 distinct and beautiful valleys, including the Casablanca, Maipo and Colchagua valleys, with vineyards that have become very well respected world-wide. Complementing the near-perfect climate, are well drained volcanic and fluvial soils and a rootstock brought from France in the 19th century which has been key in producing such well known wines as Concha y Toro, Cousino Macul, Santa Carolina and Undurragua. Grapes for white wine grown here include Sauvignon Blanc, Chardonnay, Riesling, Gewürztraminer, Chenin-Blanc, and Semillón. Grapes for reds include Cabernet Sauvignon, Merlot, and Pinot Noir.

Santiago, the capital of Chile, was founded by Pedro de Vadivia in 1541 in the Río Mapocho Valley at the foothills of the Santa Lucia hill. It is scenically located in the Central Valley, between the Cordillera de la Costa and Cordillera de los Andes and the overwhelming presence of mountains in the valley are represented by San Cristobal and Santa Lucia hills. The majority of the economic, administrative, cultural, commercial, industrial and political activities of the country are concentrated here. This unassuming city has pleasant parks, colonial mansions, excellent museums and independent cultural scene with fine restaurants and a lively nightlife.



Breakfast at the hotel.

Drive to the airport for flight to Santiago, Chile's capital city.

Then a short drive from Santiago to Vina del Mar, Chile's coastal playground, to check in to your hotel. Evening at leisure. Overnight in Vina del Mar.



Day 13 - Feb 12 - Vina del Mar (Valparaiso) (B, L)



Vina del Mar, also known as the Garden City, is located along the Pacific Coast and is a popular year-round holiday destination, providing exceptional weather, atmosphere, culture, history and fine food. The city includes beautiful mansions, luxurious hotels, parks and gardens, a municipal theatre, sporting facilities (such as the horseracing track and the famous Valparaíso Sporting Club) as well as many beaches. The palace on the Cerro Castillo is the summer residence for the Chilean president. The diversity of Vina del Mar Chile ensures visitors of an excellent vacation experience, whether you are touring the city in a horse-drawn carriage, sunning on a local beach or identifying the hundreds of flowers making up the face of the Flower Clock

Physicians - Early morning visit to a local hospital in the Vina area to learn about the Chilean healthcare system and meet with local doctors.

Afterwards the whole group will take a half day tour to see some of the sites of Valparaiso and Vina del Mar.


Valparaíso's picturesque layout, enhanced by the surrounding hills that seem to dive into the ocean, remind us that this was once the most important maritime destination of the Pacific coast before the Strait of Panama was opened to navigation in 1914. Visit the downtown area with its new government house, the Plaza Sotomayor, the Plaza Victoria, the cathedral and the harbour area. Afterwards, discover the colourful hill neighbourhoods - here, high above the city, there is a fantastic agglomeration of brightly painted houses and a fantastic view over the city.



The upper and lower parts of the city are connected with 16 funicular railways constructed around the turn of the century when the city experienced tremendous growth. Then head back north along the coastline of the bay to Viña, with its many parks of huge trees and palms that gave Viña del Mar the well deserved name of 'Garden City'. Visit the beautiful park Quinta Vergara with its amphitheatre, the museum of fine arts as well as the Casino, which was built in 1932. Lunch at a local restaurant.

The balance of the afternoon and evening is at leisure to enjoy this attractive ocean front town. Overnight in Vina del Mar.

Day 14 - Feb 13 - Vina del Mar (Isla Negra - Casablance winery valley) (B, L)



Breakfast at hotel before heading south to travel through the **Casablanca valley**, Chile's most traditional wine region and producer of the country's finest Cabernets and Merlots, from it's famous estates. Being close to the ocean, the Casablanca valley possesses a semi-arid climate and a marine influence that produces fog conditions, resulting in a transparent and radiant sun that allows the plants to grow without excess of temperature. These conditions are favorable to produce rich fruits in aroma and color thus producing one of the fruitiest wines of the region, particularly Chardonnay and Sauvignon Blancs.



First, visit the coastal resort town of **Isla Negra**, and the museum of **Pablo Neruda**, the renowned Chilean poet. Neruda won the Nobel Prize for literature in 1971. He passed away in 1973, and this, reputedly his favorite of his three houses, is now a museum, an eclectic assembly of the poet's many collections—miniatures, vessels, colored bottles, fine glassware and seashells, to name a few—as well as his manuscripts. The house and its ocean view served as an everlasting source of inspiration for Neruda, and both are absolutely enchanting Afterwards, continue to the vineyard of **Casa del Bosque** to learn about wine production in the area and sample some of it's final local Chillean wines before enjoying a delicious late lunch at the vineyard.

Return to Vina where the evening is at leisure. Overnight in Vina del Mar.

(If you are extending your tour to experience Chile's Atacama Desert you will be transferred to Santiago to stay in a hotel close to the airport due to the fact that it is an early morning flight from Santiago to Calama, the gateway to the Atacama Desert, on Feb 14)

Day 15 - Feb 14 - Vina del Mar - Concha y Toro - Santiago - Toronto (B)

Breakfast at hotel. Check out of your hotel before driving to Santiago and visiting Concha y Toro vineyard, one of the largest exporters of fine wines in Chile, famous all over South America and beyond. It was founded in 1883 by the Marquis Casa Concha, who appointed French enologist M. de Labouchere to bring from France the best and most selected stockvine to be planted in the Maipo River Valley. Concha y Toro has been the leader adopting new techniques, updating its equipment and facilities for vinification, storage and bottling and has obtained countless prizes for quality both in Chile and abroad. It's most famous wines are Don Melchor, Marqeuz de Casa Concha and Casillero del Diablo. Learn about their wine production facilities and explore the historic museum.



In the afternoon there will be time for some shopping before being transferred to an airport hotel prior to your early morning return flight to Canada the next day.

Day 16 - Feb 15, 2019 (Fri) - Arrive back in Toronto

Depart Santiago on your return flight to Toronto on Air Canada. Early evening arrival in Toronto.



OPTIONAL STOPOVER EXTENSION – ATACAMA DESERT

(5 NIGHTS: FEBRUARY 13 - 18, 2019)

The Atacama Desert has the title of being the driest desert in the world with parts of the desert having not seen any rainfall since records began. On average, the South America desert sees as little as 1 cm of rainfall a year and supports next to no vegetation. However, this is a diverse and fascinating geographical region and is used by NASA to test their lunar and Mars exploration vehicles. This South America desert is set amongst a rich cultural heritage where ancient remnants of indigenous human habitation are reflected by human and animal figures that have been carved out on barren hillsides.



Unexpectedly, at points the arid Atacama Desert nestles alongside lagoons, springs and rich farmland busy with Atacama Desert animals such as grazing llamas and alpacas. This part of Chile also contains the world's largest open copper mine at Chuquicamata. The rich copper and mineral deposits led to a huge natural supply of sodium nitrate (lamingos). While the supply has long since been exhausted, the desert is littered with abandoned mining towns. The Atacama Desert Chile sits at one end of neighbouring Bolivia's vast salt plain of Salar de Uyuni, the world's largest salt flat.

The gateway to exploring the sparsely populated Atacama Desert region is through **San Pedro de Atacama**, considered the archaeological capital of Chile, and ecotourism friendly Lauca National Park. The village of San Pedro de Atacama is located 1670 km north of Santiago and lies in the middle of the desert acting as a small cluster of civilization for tourists. The town has existed for 13,000 years, since the indigenous people of these lands gave birth to the Atacama culture, which celebrates life through color, dance and music that permeate every corner of this vast desert. This little oasis sits on the edge of the Salar de Atacama (Salt Lakes of Atacama) and is surrounded by the imposing La Sal and Domeyko mountain ranges, some of the highest peaks in the Andes. The Puritama, Purifica and Vilama rivers flow around the outskirts of San Pedro, forming majestic ravines and giving life to this desert oasis. Without them, San Pedro would be uninhabitable. The town offers abundant sights and activities including sand boarding and mountain biking. Its cobblestone streets are lined with adobe houses, ancestral churches, squares, craft stores, restaurants, bars and there is an archaeological museum with an array of ancient artifacts and preserved Inca mummies. Interestingly the display includes a number of tools used for smoking hallucinogenic plants native to the land.

This northern most region of Chile sits atop an altiplano some 7,500 feet above sea level and stretches into Bolivia and Peru. The high altitude, absence of cloud cover and light pollution make this remote desert the perfect place for astronomical observation. The altiplano also contains a number of volcanoes and lakes and while some of the volcanoes are extinct, active geysers betray the ones that still bubble with life. At such high altitude, El Tatio contains the highest geyser field to be found in the world at 4,300 meters.

There will also be a **medical educational program** component to this extension which will include visiting a **local shaman** that does therapy based on drum sounds and local herbs as well as visiting the **Copper hospital** in Calama, which specializes in the treatment of harsh mining conditions in this industry.



Day 14 - Feb 13 - Santiago (Airport hotel stopover)

Day 14 will be as per the main Chile program but at the end of the day you will be transferred to Santiago to stay in a hotel close to the airport due to the fact that it is an early morning flight from Santiago to Calama, the gateway to the Atacama Desert, on February 14)

Day 15 - Feb 14 - Santiago - Calama - San Pedro & the Moon Valley (B)

Early morning flight from Santiago to Calama. You will be met on arrival by your local guide and will be transferred to your hotel in San Pedro de Atacama. San Pedro is an unusually colourful village located 2.440 m above sea level in the middle of a green oasis.

En route, there will be a medical tour of **Hospital del Cobre** (Copper hospital) in Calama - a hospital specializing in mining related and high altitude diseases.

In the afternoon, explore the mystifying Valle de la Luna, the famous **Moon Valley**. The Valley of the Moon is a fascinating area dotted with sand and stone formations which floods and winds have shaped for thousands of years, creating a series of soft desert colours. Many small hills and impressive sharp peaks highlight this special place.



The area, one of incomparable beauty, resembles a fragment of lunar landscape and this natural phenomenon was created by the meeting of the cordillera and the desert, and by landslides from the cordillera ravines which softly changed the gradient of its slopes. On moonlit nights, the valley is an indescribably impressive sight, full of majesty, silence and icy beauty and at sunset see how the light intensifies the impression of a moonscape as you climb a sand dune to watch this spectacle.

Moon Valley has been declared a Natural Sanctuary and is part of the Los Flamencos National Reserve Evening at leisure. Overnight in hotel in San Pedro.

Day 16 - Feb 15 - San Pedro, Toconao and the Atacama Salt Lake (B, L)

After breakfast, visit **San Pedro de Atacama** – the centre of a Palaeolithic civilization that built impressive rock fortresses on the mountains encircling the green valley. The colonial church was constructed in 1577 and is the largest and most beautiful church of the region. The extraordinary archaeological museum of Padre Gustavo Le Paige shows, among its many archaeological pre-Hispanic artefacts, several amazingly well preserved mummies, including one known as "Miss Chile." After this visit, drive 4 km to reach the pre-Columbian village Tulor with an approx. age of 3000 years. The archaeological remains are the oldest evidence of human settlement in the valley. Then continue to **Pukara de Quitor** a fortress, which was conquered in 1540 by the Spanish conquistadores defeating the Incan troops who, in turn, had captured it from the pre-Incan cultures and extended the fortification.



In the afternoon, continue to **Toconao**, a village where locals dedicate themselves to the manufacture of white volcanic stone sculptures. Then, onto the huge **Atacama Salt Lake**, an inland sea formed millions of years ago. The vast emptiness with the white salt crusts stretched out in front of you as far as the eyes can reach is overwhelming. It simply is one of the most spectacular and dramatic landscapes in Chile.

The Atacama salt flat is the biggest in Chile, covering an area of more than 3,000 km2. The air is extraordinarily dry, and as a result absolutely transparent. Because of this, the other end of the salt flat, some 70 km away, can be seen easily. Below the salt flat, hidden by a thick, irregular layer of salt, blackened by the desert dust, lies a lake which contains the largest reserve of lithium in the world. This mineral is used in some high technological industries and is exploited in the southern sector of the salt flat. In some places, the crust has been opened to give way to small lagoons which are a favourite habitat for water birds, particularly flamingos, coots and guallatas. The name salt cordillera derives from the fact that its rocks possess a large quantity of calcium sulphate, which makes them appear as though they have been sprinkled with salt.

Evening at leisure. Overnight in hotel in San Pedro.

Day 17 - Feb 16 - El Tatio and Machuca (B)

Depart your hotel very early this morning (about 4:00 am) to reach the El Tatio Geysers at an altitude of 4.300 m before sun-rise. In a remote setting it is the highest geothermal field in the world and offers a spectacular scenery. Make sure to bring warm clothes because it is very cold in the morning at this altitude. At dawn, powerful spurts of steam shoot up from various blowholes. The steaming ponds are encrusted with brilliant salt crystals reflecting the metal-blue sky at dawn. There will be plenty of time to enjoy this beautiful natural wonder before continuing to the village of Machuca where the ancient llama caravans used to rest from their travels on the "Inca High-way". Today only few people live here.



During the tour, there will also be a demonstration of local traditional healing techniques by a local shaman (therapy using drum sounds and local herbs).

Afterwards, return to San Pedro de Atacama.

Leisure time in the afternoon. Overnight in San Pedro.

Day 18 - Feb 17 - Calama - Santiago - Toronto (B)

After breakfast, some independent time to continue to explore San Pedro de Atacama before being transferred to Calama airport for your afternoon return flight to Santiago.

Overnight at airport hotel to be ready to for your morning flight from Santiago due to the fact that you it is an early morning flight from Santiago back to Toronto on Air Canada.



Day 19 - Feb 18 (Mon) - Arrive back in Toronto

Depart Santiago on international flight back to Toronto on Air Canada arriving in Toronto in the evening.

TRAVEL DOCUMENTATION, VISA & OTHER IMMIGRATION REQUIREMENTS: A Canadian citizen must be in possession of a passport that must remain valid for a minimum of 6 months from the date of conclusion of their journey for all destinations offered with the exception of New Zealand, Spain/Portugal and countries on our Eastern Europe program where the passport must remain valid for a minimum of 3 months from the date of conclusion of their journey. Tour participants must also ensure that they comply with all visa and health requirements of countries they intend to visit.

A tourist entry visa (or, in some cases, a reciprocity fee) is required for entry into the following destinations offered by DOT/DT/BIC -

- Bhutan, Brasil, China, India, Kenya, Myanmar, Tanzania, Vietnam (tourist entry visa, or a visa pre-approval letter in some cases, must be obtained prior to departure from Canada)
- Cambodia, Laos, Zambia (tourist entry visa may be obtained upon arrival in the destination)
- For entry into Argentina, a reciprocity fee is payable (this must be paid prior to leaving Canada)



A tourist entry visa is not required for entry into Bali (Indonesia), Ecuador, New Zealand, Peru, South Africa, Spain and any country on our Eastern Europe program.

Non Canadian citizens may have different requirements. It is the passenger's responsibility to ensure that all his or her passport, visa and mandatory health vaccination requirements for entry into the country are met and the cancellation penalties referred to above will apply if a passenger is not allowed into the destination country (or determines in advance of departure that he will not be allowed into the destination country) due to lack of proper documentation including, but not limited to, passport, visa, customs, health or currency provisions required by the destination country thus preventing him from participate in the tour.

Final tour documents consisting of detailed tour itinerary, vouchers, and airline tickets will be forwarded approximately 2-3 weeks prior to departure subject to receipt of final payment.

PRICING POLICY: Accommodations and services at the destination are contracted in local currencies and/or US Dollars. Due to frequent fluctuations in currency exchange (as well as other factors beyond our control including, but not limited to, fuel costs, transportation taxes and airport and local surcharges), prices are subject to change with or without notice and surcharges may apply for which we would endeavor to inform you as soon as possible. However, once we have received your final payment we would either waive any price increase or allow you to cancel your booking without penalty.

UNUSED PORTION OF THE TOUR: No refund will be made for any unused accommodations, missed meals, transportation segments, cruise portions, sightseeing tours or any other service. Such unused items are neither refundable nor exchangeable.

ACCOMMODATIONS: We use a variety of accommodations on our programs with many of our properties specifically chosen to reflect the local style and culture of the region. Our rating system reflects the majority of the accommodations throughout each program but some variety can occur. Ratings are based not only on room quality but also on facilities and location. Accommodation ratings in overseas destinations outside of Canada are an arbitrary measure and their definition from country to country can differ slightly as well as not always being consistent between individual properties in that particular destination nor are they necessarily comparable to an equivalent rating in North America. Rooms are assigned by the respective supplier(s) on a run-of-the-house basis, in category (ies) as specified in the itinerary and the right is reserved to substitute properties/hotels/lodges/camps/cruise/ships as conditions warrant such change for reasons beyond our control. Accommodations on twin occupancy basis, is provided at the properties/hotels/lodges/camps/cruise ships as specified or similar. Single room supplements apply to persons occupying sole use of a room/cabin but travelling with other passengers on the same tour and sharing transport cost on transfers, game drives, coach tours, sightseeing and excursions. Quoted single room rate does not necessarily mean single occupancy of a double room, as several of the establishments offered have especially designed single occupancy units.

SINGLE PASSENGERS TRAVELLING TOGETHER: If you are travelling with a companion and each paying separately the regular each of two double sharing accommodation rate and your companion decides to cancel, the remaining travelling passenger will be responsible for either finding a replacement travelling companion to take the cancelled passenger's place or must pay the single supplement and travel on a single basis.

MEALS & BEVERAGES: Meals as included on our itineraries are either buffet meals and/or table d'hôte. Meals ordered through room service are not included and must be paid directly to the establishment. Alcoholic beverages, soft drinks, and bottled water are included only where indicated on the itinerary. Unless specifically mentioned in your itinerary, all drinks (both alcoholic and non-alcoholic) are to purchased and paid directly to the establishments.

OPTIONAL TOURS, EXCURSIONS AND TRIP EXTENSIONS: It is our intent to operate any Optional Extensions on a private group basis. However, should the number of participants be of an insufficient level, we reserve the right to either -

- (1) add a surcharge to the previously stated selling price to be able to still offer the extension on a private basis or
- (2) operate any individual tour on a shared basis with other non-group participants or
- (3) cancel the tour and provide a full refund of all monies paid.

No refunds can be provided for cancellation of any tour by the client while in the destination.

SPECIAL REQUESTS: While we will make every effort to accommodate special requests, eg., room/cabin locations, adjoining rooms, non-smoking rooms, bed preferences, special dietary meal requests, these cannot be guaranteed and DOT/OT/BIC cannot be held responsible if such requests cannot be fulfilled. Requests for upgrading rooms/cabins are subject to additional charges. Any deviations to the standard program arrival and departure flight dates should be notified to us by separate e-mail at the time of booking and are subject to availability and also any applicable flight class supplement.

DOCUMENT DELIVERY: Your travel documents will be sent to you approximately 3 weeks prior to departure. For bookings received within 3 weeks of departure, express delivery of documents will require a courier delivery fee of \$30 to cover extra handling and processing. Additional courier charges will apply for all residents outside of Canada, irrespective of when the booking is made.

The Act is administered by the Travel Industry Council of Ontario (TICO), the government regulated body which is responsible for enforcing and monitoring the Travel Industry Act, including the protection of advance monies paid to it's registrants by consumers.
